

"Jesus knew that the Father had put all things under his power, and that he had come from God and was returning to God; so he got up from the meal, took off his outer clothing, and wrapped a towel around his waist. After that, he poured water into a basin and **began to wash his disciples' feet**, drying them with the towel that was wrapped around him." (John: 13: 3-5)





Jesus as a Rabi or Teacher does not miss any opportunity to

educate his disciples the important lessons of life. Even on his last supper with his disciples, he teaches them one of the most important lessons of love, service and humility. Very often words alone do not suffice and so actions are required to accompany to carry the message across. Jesus could have given a long discourse (homily) on humility just by words of mouth. However, he chooses to bend down and wash the disciples' feet. No teacher in the entire history of mankind had done this. It was shocking for the disciples how could a teacher wash his disciples' feet. And that is why Simon Peter on behalf of all the disciples said, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" ... "No," said Peter, "you shall never wash my feet." After washing the feet of all his disciples, including Judas Iscariot, Jesus concludes his lesson on humility by saying, "Now that I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also should wash one another's feet."

On his wheelchair the 87 year old, Pope Francis washed and kissed the feet of 12 women inmates at a prison in Rome on the Holy Thursday. "Jesus humiliates himself," Francis said. "With this gesture, he makes us understand what he had said: 'I am not here to be served, but to serve ... He teaches us the path of service."

Let this not be only a Holy Thursday ritual, but as Christians we must do the same in our communities and families. Being Christian is loving and serving our fellow human beings without prejudice, without boundaries and without limit. Service with love and humility is the core message of Jesus, and so of Christianity.

Belltar is a small and backward village. Missionaries of Charity Sisters visit this village regularly and distribute medicines to the sick. Free Medical Camps in this village are very rare. SASAC will have follow up programs to improve health and hygiene of this village.
